MINUTES 2021 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING SUNDAY JANUARY 23RD 2022 ACPE

<u>Welcome and Opening Remarks</u> President opened the meeting at 3:59pm.

<u>Official Apologies:</u> Linda Brown, Steven Ransome, Craig Air, Kendall Ballard

<u>Minutes from AGM held 31st January 2021</u> Moved Querida Faber and seconded by Philip Argy those minutes from the 2020 AGM be accepted. Approved.

<u>Matters Arising:</u> No matters arising from the Minutes from the 2020 AGM.

President's Report:

Welcome to the 2021 AGM. I would love nothing more than to be standing here talking about what a fabulous season we have had, but unfortunately that is not the case as we were forced to abandon the season due to the ever-increasing COVID-19 lockdowns.

Our sport thrives and survives on the hard work and commitment of our volunteer base and, although being pushed at times this volunteer base has proven to be very resilient and determined to succeed. IHNSW were actively seeking to broaden that volunteer base into the marketing and recruitment area and this will be a strong focus for the upcoming 2022 season.

As I outlined in my last presidents report, the financial health of this organisation, our affiliated clubs and the rinks are all highly dependent on the number of players we have. We continue to maintain the viewpoint that a larger number of players and fewer financial constraints will provide us the opportunity to provide a better product for our members and in turn the development of more facilities. This was our sports biggest challenge for the past two seasons with the effects of COVID-19 having an impact on player numbers and the financial impact on our rinks. Our organisation has some major challenges ahead within the securing of sufficient ice time as well as the recruitment of junior players. I am very proud of the resilience shown throughout these ordeals and feel we are going to be a stronger organisation as a result.

IHNSW has continued to work closely with the State government bodies to keep our sport active and once again we were able to secure additional relief funding for the clubs and IHNSW. We will continue to work closely with them to ensure that we mitigate the risks involved and ensure our great sport remains viable and successful.

The continuing cancellation of the IIHF tournaments and then our National Championships, has further challenged the association in continuing to develop and maintain our elite level players. We ran a very

successful 3 on 3 cross ice preseason tournament at the start 2021 and we are currently taking registrations to do this again in February 2022.

At the start of the season, we successfully launched the Concussion Policy and I was able to visit and present this to the majority of clubs. The interaction was a valuable opportunity for coaching and management staff to better understand the responsibility we all have in this very important area of our sport.

The draft constitution has been completed and circulated to the clubs for comment and to reiterate once again the importance of this change to ensure that we continue to serve our membership and optimise our potential to attract government funding and grants by showing good governance. In 2018 we received two grants totaling \$40,000 for special projects, as well as our ongoing operational grant of \$20,000. The special projects funding has been used to fund the legal review and ongoing consultation requirements that may be required to implement the change.

The State government is keen to support organisations such as ours, but they need to be assured that we are making the best use of the resources they provide, and that the membership is being well served. Sport Australia (SA), the federal government body that controls most sports funding, and the NSW Office of Sport have made it clear that they expect sporting associations to regularly renew their organisations rules and practices to ensure best practice governance and transparency.

We trust that clubs have begun reviewing the draft as these changes will be substantial but necessary in the ongoing operation of our sport.

I would like to thank all of those who have participated in our online Teams meetings and engaging in the process. This past year, more than ever we have had some hard but necessary discussions and commitment from all our clubs has been very inspiring for the future of the sport.

I would like to thank Emily for her commitment to our sport and for her ongoing support through these tough times. Without Emily we would all be very lost in the complexity required to run our great organisation.

I would once again like to take the opportunity to thank our tireless Executive, and whilst it is not an easy task to run this sport, without you I would be utterly lost. Despite work and family commitments this extraordinary group of people are always stepping up and committing their irreplaceable time to keep this sport functioning successfully.

Ice Hockey NSW committee is proud to present another financially successful year of operation. Financially, the future of the IHNSW for the coming years is sound. IHNSW will continue to try to provide the best value for Ice Hockey players during the coming year. We all look forward to another successful year. If any member wishes to inspect the IHNSW accounts please ask, they are open to all members

TREASURERS REPORT

Summary

Another year of unusual circumstances due to Covid-19. Only about half of the winter season completed. Summer season has been going well.

The auditors have bought in the provision for Annual and Long Service Leave. Net Profit is up on last year with a profit posted for the year of \$121,690.71 mainly due to Covid-19 and only half the winter season completed. Net income was up after more normal registrations this year before the closure due to Covid. IHNSW will be providing discounts on registration this year, with increased government grants for Covid-19 to help cover the discounted fees. The team fees for both 2021 and 2020 were included in this year. Final Job Keeper payment received.

Increase in expenses were mainly due to the audit payments for the last 4 years of \$32,400 paid this year.

COVID-19 issues

- Only Atoms was not held again this year along with all the state tournaments and no teams going overseas. Amounts in the teams Quebec are for refunds which have been paid and payments coming in after the end of the last financial year.
- AGM costs and Medals & Trophies were for last year as the end of winter season was late.

After a trying year, Ice Hockey NSW committee, is presenting a good outcome for the year in these trying times. IHNSW will continue to try to provide the best value for Ice Hockey players during the coming year. We all look forward to a more successful 2022. Total Operating Expenses

With hockey returning to pre-COVID normal this year, IHNSW was pleased to provide discounts to our members in recognition for their support and understanding during COVID affected seasons. Income from player registrations is much lower than last year reflecting the upfront discount offered to Senior Players, and Grants Acquittal is higher than last year reflecting the payment made to clubs based on their Junior Player numbers, which was aimed at providing greater development opportunities for their members.

Our liabilities remain high however our financial position remains strong. Despite the challenging income environment, IHNSW was pleased to be able to financially continue supporting all aspects of development within our sport, including playing, coaching, and officiating, as well as supporting the 3 on 3 tournament earlier this past year.

IHNSW is committed to providing the best environment for our members to learn, develop, and fine-tune their skills, and we look forward to ensuring our members continue to receive opportunities to enjoy the game.

The 2022 IHNSW season provided some good opportunities for goaltenders to grow personally and improve their overall game. I was proud of the way our goalies presented themselves on and off the ice and they must be commended on their commitment and hard work to the position and the goaltender community.

We started off the season with the IHNSW Preseason Goaltender camp, 19th to 20th February at the Penrith Ice Palace. Although the numbers were limited (6) I felt that it was successful for those who attended. A big thank you to Sera Dogramaci for assisting me with my first camp as IHNSW Goalie Coordinator and those who volunteered their time.

Our 2023 Preseason Goaltender camp will run the weekend of 28th/29th January in Erina. At the time of writing this report (15 Jan 23) we already have 17 registrants. These are great numbers, but one concern is that only 2 registered are U12, the rest are 13+.

I have noticed that grassroot goaltending, and therefore numbers, are not where they should be. There is already a shortage of goaltenders a club levels but lack of grassroot goaltending in NSW will limit the growth of the game in IHNSW. Getting younger kids interested and "trying out" the position needs to be worked on and a major priority for 2023.



2022 Preseason Goaltender Camp

We were fortunate to have Matt Bourgeois in Australia in August 2021. Matt runs <u>https://rhptraining.com/hockey</u> and brings together years of playing high level hockey (NCAA/CHL) and developing goalies at all levels.

Matt ran an NSW Goalie Clinic in conjunction with a Level 2 coaching course in Erina. He also gave up his time to visit various Clubs around Sydney to work with their goaltenders. Below is a detailed synopsis from Sera Dogramaci:

Level 2 Coaching Course

Matthew presented at the Level 2 Coaching Course and shared his knowledge and expertise across all modules. In particular, as Matt is engaged with Hockey Canada and instructs in their courses, direct comparisons could be made, highlighting the differences between Canada and Australia. The knowledge was well received, opened up interesting conversations, and created a network of coaches willing to work together and share their skillsets across clubs.

Goalie Clinic

We added a two-hour Goalie Clinic to the end of the Coaching Course, which allowed the coaches to run stations and learn more about goaltending. We were fortunate enough to have some former goalies attend the course (Stuart Clemie, Adam Hales and Wouter Leenen), who understood the fundamentals and were able to assist individual goalies. Additionally, Remi Harvey ran a skating station, and Bryce Conrad ran a puck handling station. With 19 goalies in attendance, there were no more than 4 goalies per group, and with 2 coaches per station, the goalies received plenty of individual instruction and feedback.

Local Goalie Nights

During Matt's stay, we ran local goalie nights, where our clubs worked together to enable this to happen. These sessions were open to junior and senior goalies, focusing on fundamental skills to easily and immediately integrate into any goalies' game. The clubs provided additional coaches and shooters, and were organised as follows:

COIR: Canterbury Eagles and Ice Wolves: half ice, 8 goalies.

EIA: Central Coach Stingrays and Newcastle North Stars: half ice, 3 goalies.

LCC: Liverpool Saints and Blacktown Flyers: half ice, 7 goalies.

MIR: Sydney Bears and Norwest Emperors: end zone, 10 goalies.

AIHL

Matt was fortunate enough to attend an AIHL game on Friday 19th August, and watch the Ice Dogs vs the Sydney Bears. He was also invited to attend the Ice Dogs training session the following Thursday to work directly with Jakob Doornbos.

Financials

Matt was hosted at our house, so we absorbed accommodation, meal and transport expenses within our household. The only expense is for Matt's international flight, which totalled \$3054.34.

Recommendations

I believe we have found a structure that benefitted not only our goalie, but coaching community as well. A total of 43 individual goalies were coached directly by Matt, across all the sessions he was involved in, from Come and Try and Grassroots, to AWIHL and AIHL goalies.

I would encourage for future Level 2 Coaching Courses, that we invite an international coach to not only present, but also run a players or goalie clinic, as well as skills sessions at club training sessions.

Thank you for your continued support of our goalie initiatives. I'm excited to see what else IHNSW can achieve for our sport, and continue to lead the way."

2023 looks like another great year for IHNSW goaltenders. Sera Dogramaci has been able to bring Steve Thompson out to Australia. He will work with goaltenders at the various National Dev camps and will also run our IHNSW camp at the end of January.

Steve is a member of the USA Hockey goaltender coaching community since 2014, Thompson joined USA Hockey full-time as its ADM manager of goaltending in June 2019, before the role transitioned into manager of player development - goaltending in November 2022. He is responsible for the development and management of the American goaltending program, including player development, coach development, parent education, and more.

This is another fantastic opportunity for our goaltenders to be educated on the position and strengthen their skills, fundamentals, mechanics and overall development.

I look forward to working with our goaltenders in 2023 and providing them with the tools to become outstanding individuals and become competent goaltenders while having fun.

The IHNSW Treasurer and Executive Officer have a standing invitation to all meetings. The Treasurer attended 6 meetings from 22 March 2022

Review of Activities:

In order of activities the ARC

- 1. Finalised the Risk Survey including populating the survey to assist the incoming IHNSW Executive action and complete. An important function of the ARC is to
 - a. Review risk management policy and risk management system
 - b. Review risk profile
 - c. Review internal controls & operational effectiveness of risk policies and report to the board

IHNSW Executive has not reviewed or completed a risk survey, so the risk system is "nonexistent." The ARC will continue to encourage the Executive to complete and engage is this important task.

- 2. Review of the Terms of Reference(ToR) for the committee, making any necessary adjustments including varying the number for a quorum. It is becoming difficult to engage volunteers with appropriate accounting/financial/business experience.
- 3. The ARC reviewed its performance against the ToR and identified the need for an annualised work schedule to ensure ToR activities are met
- 4. Development of an Annual Work Plan that itemises all activities and includes the extent of Executive committee involvement.
- 5. Review of Insurance activities.

- 6. Recommended that the Treasurer and Executive review monthly financial reports and bank balances. Have requested these be supplied to ARC each time tabled at the same time Treasurer reports to the Executive. This process was only satisfied on one occasion.
- 7. Reviewed compliance of continuous disclosure obligations.
- 8. The ARC was asked to evaluate the risk to females playing checking hockey in the 18U grade. The request to evaluate the risk is outside A&RC's responsibilities under the ToR. However, the committee provided advice and direction on the areas of risk that the Executive should consider. Including:
 - a. That the original decision was made on the basis of safety concerns at IIHF/IHA level. Consider if safety is no longer a risk or how original risk has been mitigated.
 - b. Direct liability for directors-weight of decision, especially if IHNSW decision is contrary to existing rules at IIHF/IHA level.
 - c. Insurance risk–are female players covered under existing national player insurance for activities that are contrary to IIHF/IHA rules
- 9. Review of the financial year end 2022 Audit plan, found to be satisfactory. At the time of this report, the ARC had not yet sighted the approved financial reports being externally audited.
- 10. Open items also include:
 - a. Review of State Teams financials.
 - b. Review of IHNSW financial statements as have not been received.
 - c. Unusual balance sheet items being investigated by treasurer.
 - d. Review of "conflict of interest/related party transactions."








